

Instructions for the Preparation of Camera-Ready Contributions to ICMS 05 - Marrakech Proceedings

Abstract. The abstract should summarize the contents of the paper and should contain at least 70 and at most 150 words. It should be set in 10-point font size and should be inset 1.0 cm from the right and left margins.

1 Introduction

For the contributions, the following page limits apply: Plenary Talk (8 Pages), Parallel Talk or Poster (5 Pages). Your original, final, PDF or MS Word file/camera - ready copy, which should not exceed the specified pages in length, should be submitted (or uploaded), no later than June 30 2005, to the ICMS 2005 conference Email address.

1.1 Printing Area

The printing area is 170 mm × 257 mm. The text should be justified to occupy the full line width, so that the right margin is not ragged, with words hyphenated as appropriate. Please fill pages so that the length of the text is no less than 180 mm.

1.2 Layout, Typeface, Font Sizes, and Numbering

Use 10-point type for the name(s) of the author(s) and 10-point type for the address(es) and the abstract. For the main text, please use 10-point type and single-line spacing. We recommend using Computer Modern Roman (CM) fonts, Times, or one of the similar typefaces widely used in photo-typesetting. Italic type may be used to emphasize words in running text.

Table 1. Font sizes of headings. Table captions should always be centered and positioned above the tables.

Title (centered)	Title ...	16 point, bold
1 st -level heading	1 Introduction	12 point, bold
2 nd -level heading	2.1 Printing Area	11 point, bold
3 rd -level heading	Headings. Text follows ...	10 point, bold
4 th -level heading	<i>Remark.</i> Text follows ...	10 point, italic

1.3 Figures and Photographs

Please produce your figures electronically, if possible, and integrate them into your text file.

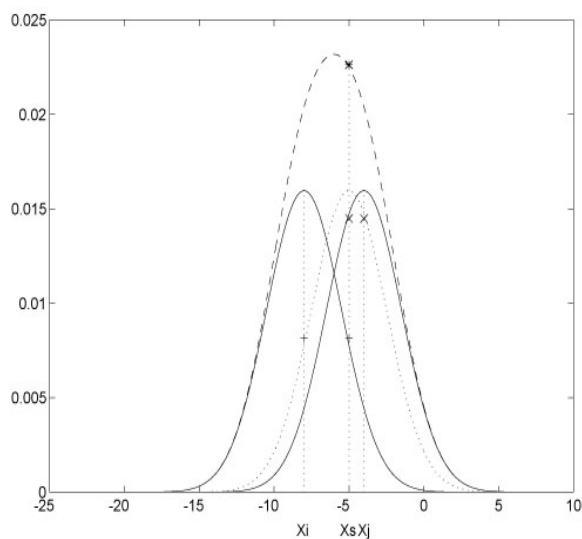


Fig. 1. *The figure caption should be entered and set in italics*

Figures should be numbered and should have a caption which should always be positioned *under* the figures, in contrast to the caption belonging to a table, which should always appear *above* the table. Please center the captions between the margins and set them in 10-point type (Fig. 1 shows an example).

1.4 Formulas

Displayed equations or formulas are centered and set on a separate line. Displayed expressions should be numbered for reference. The numbers should be consecutive within each section or within the contribution, with numbers enclosed in parentheses and set on the right margin. For example,

$$x + y = z. \quad (1)$$

1.5 Citations

The list of references is headed “References” and is not assigned a number in the decimal system of headings. The list should be set in small print and placed at the end of your contribution, in front of the appendix, if one exists. Please do not insert a page break before the list of references if the page is not completely filled. An example is given at the end of this information sheet. For citations in the text please use square brackets and consecutive numbers: [1], [2], [3], ...
